The EFG Staff has scoured this year's video game and board game releases to help make some great recomendations for your family! We had a lot of fun making these suggestions. Nintendo had a great year. PlayStation released a very, very good mascot platformer in Astrobot. And the board game space has been as vibrant as ever!

Video Games

Playstation

Modern gaming has three major options: a PC, Xbox or PS5. The PS5 is a worthy investment with more storage, faster performance, and better visuals than it's predecessors and it's competition. This is a great console for those looking to upgrade from older systems, especially for PS4 owners, those without an extensive library with another console, and those willing to invest in a hefty price. PlayStation offers several tempting tier options offering old games as well as earlier access to modern games. It is the best PlayStation thus far and an excellent family console.

Astro Bot

I talk about this in our review section as well, but Astro Bot is an amazing game. It may be a single-player experience, but parents can play along with their children and explain all the references from throughout PlayStation history. PlayStation finally has a mascot platformer that can rival some of the best games from Nintendo.

EA Sports College Football 25

This is the first college football game to come out in over a decade since NCAA Football 13. It is a great game for this holiday, especially when football season is over and you are dying to get back to the gridiron. This game has all 134 FBS teams and their respective stadiums, so more than likely you will find the college you support.

Final Fantasy VII Rebirth

FF7 Rebirth is the second game in the Final Fantasy Remake Trilogy and is probably better for the older members of the family. It really earns its T rating from the ESRB. This is one of the most beautiful games we've seen on the PlayStation 5. We loved our time with the game and are waiting eagerly for the third game. This is a must own for Final Fantasy fans.

Cat Quest III

This is the *purr*fect game for the cat lover in your family. If you enjoyed that pun, then you definitely need to get this game because there are tons of them throughout. If you have a PlayStation Plus Extra or Premium at the time this magazine was written, you can also play Cat Quest 1 and Cat Quest 2.

Spider-Man 2

Spider-Man 2 may have come out last year, but we still consider it to be a perfect holiday addition for your PlayStation 5 owner. This is a direct sequel, so you may want to get the original Spider-Man and Spider-Man Miles Morales before you pick this game up.

Xbox

One of the best parts of the Xbox ecosystem is Xbox Game Pass. It is an incredible value for anyone who owns an Xbox. If you need a gift for an Xbox gamer and don't really know what else to give them, then you can reliably fall back on an Xbox Game Pass gift card. The subscriptions stack so your gift will automatically tack onto their existing subscription!









Metaphor: ReFantazio

Atlus has been making RPGs for years. The Shin Megami Tensei and Persona series are marvelous, but they are definitely not made for the light of heart. Metaphor, however, earned a T rating from the ESRB by cutting out a lot of the violence, language, and other questionable content from its other franchises. Instead, we have a beautifully animated story exploring freedom and what it means to different people.

Balatro

Do you like poker? Do you like roguelikes? Do you like poker roguelikes? If you answered yes to all three of these questions (let's be honest, you probably didn't know what to say to the last one) then this is the game for you! Balatro is a poker roguelike that you don't even need to be good at poker to play. It will help you through the basic fundamentals of the game. If you have Apple Arcade you can also play this on your IOS device with the subscription.

Prince of Persia: The Lost Crown

Prince of Persia is a game franchise that dates back to the Apple II. It is generally well loved, but it hasn't found real success since the PS2. The Lost Crown is a beautifully animated Metroidvania game that also includes some pretty slick combat options. Anyone looking for a cool action game to sink their teeth into should give this one a look.

Star Wars Outlaws

Who doesn't love Star Wars? Outlaws is an openworld action game that takes place between Empire Strikes Back and Return of the Jedi. You play as a smuggler named Kay Vess as she gathers a group of scoundrels to set up and pull off a major heist. It's full of excitement and adventure as you travel from planet to planet infiltrating bases and completing missions for various cartel leaders. Ubisoft games are known for being on sale often, so this is a game that should be easy to find at less than full price.

Nintendo

While there are questions about whether or not a Nintendo Switch investment is the right move (we talk about that in this very magazine), access to Nintendo's extensive library alone is a valid reason to buy this incredible little powerhouse. A handheld game console, this device can also be easily plugged into your television and transform into a large-screen experience. The Switch 2 (which currently does not have a release date) will not change the amount of fun and accessibility this tiny console provides. Even if owning the newest technology is important to you, you will have more than enough time to enjoy all that this mighty competitor provides.

The Legend of Zelda: Echoes of Wisdom

Finally Zelda stars in her own game and it's a great one, especially if you have a daughter that wants to play a game with a female protagonist. It may be single player, but you can also play along with your kids and give each other ideas on how to beat the many different puzzles the game throws at you. If you want more information about this game, there is a full length review elsewhere in this magazine.

Mario and Luigi: Brothership

This is a game that someone new to the RPG genre can pick up and play and not have any problems with the mechanics. The series does a great job of making RPGs accessible to all ages, as long as they can read.

Super Mario Party Jamboree

This game is the perfect multiplayer game for the whole family. It adds five brand new boards and two boards from previous games in the franchise. You can also add on handicaps for the younger players in your group so that they are not always at the back of the pack. If you don't have time for a full Mario Party playthrough, you can also save in the middle of the game or just have some fun playing minigames.

Princess Peach Showtime

This is another game with a strong female protagonist. Princess Peach explores different stage productions throughout the story and each one plays differently. This means you get to play multiple different kinds of game during your playthrough. Your kids will definitely have fun putting Peach in different outfits and decorating her dress as the game progresses

Paper Mario: The Thousand Year Door Remake

This GameCube remake takes the original fan favorite and makes everything awesome about the original even better. This is a little more advanced of an RPG than the Mario and Luigi series, but it is still friendly and accessible. The best parts of the game are the companions you meet along the way and how they interact with Mario and the world around them. The writing is witty and some of the scenarios are laugh-out-loud funny. (Just wait till you get to the wrestling sequence.)

Nintendo World Championship: NES Edition

Has mom or dad ever wanted to show their kids what games were like back in the day? This game takes 13 NES games and slices them up into challenges. Who can get a mushroom faster in Super Mario Bros.? Who can get the sword faster from the old man in The Legend of Zelda? This game has 148 more challenges just like the ones listed above that you can challenge your family to.



Board Games

Dungeons and Dragons 2024 Players Handbook

Dungeons and Dragons has released an update to the core rules for the first time since 2014. The new Players Handbook is a hearty book that is full of fantasy art and a ton of new rules to help



enhance your D&D experience. If you and your family play D&D and have been on the fence, this is a great time to pick up the new book!

Games for the Whole Family

13 Beavers

- Age: 7+
- Players: 2-6

Take a wild ride down the river and try to be the first to get your beaver to Paradise. In this push your luck game, players are trying to guess if the next number in the deck is higher or lower than the face-up card. Guess right and you move your beaver forward. Guess wrong and your beaver has to go back to their dam. Along your journey you will encounter fishing, wolves, lava, and rapids. This hilarious game is great fun for all ages!

Trio

- Age: 8+
- Players: 3-6

Three is (unsurprisingly) the key number in Trio. Players are collecting three cards of the same number and trying to be the first person to collect three sets of three. The other path to victory is to collect the set of sevens. This light card game relies a little bit on luck and a bit on memory, too. Players are trying to make a trio of the same number by revealing card(s) from the field or reveal the highest or lowest card from any player's hand. Cards continue to be revealed until either a trio is made or a card not matching is revealed. There is also a spicy mode, for an additional challenge, and a team mode.

Crossbows & Catapults

- Age: 7+
- Players: 2

For anyone with nostalgia, there is a remake of the 1983 game in partnership with Goliath and Restoration Games. There are two versions of the game available: the base game, Castle Battle, and the deluxe edition with more pieces and options, Fortress War. This dexterity game has you launching projectiles on your catapult to destroy your opponent's castle and army. Can your army keep your castle safe?

Gap

- Age: 8+
- Players: 2-6

A light, simple card game for families, Gap is a set-collection game with a twist. Players are trying to collect cards of the same color to make sets. However, the numbers on the card and their adjacent number impact the numbers you can take and place from the center field. Your score is based on the number of cards you have the most and least of within the same colors. Gameplay is



Wrath of Fire Mountain

- Age: 8+
- Players: 2-4

This prehistoric strategy game has players trying to dominate the land, and bring dinosaurs









to their aid. On the players turn, they roll dice to determine what options they have. Based on the dice, pieces can be placed or moved. Players need to be on the lookout for tremors (where the tiles of the board shift) or eruptions. When an eruption occurs, that's the end of an era and the region is scored, but that is not necessarily the end of the game. Rather, the game ends when a player reaches the points target.

For the Experienced Gamer

Gnome Hollow

- Age: 12+
- Players: 2-4

Join the world of Gnome Hollow and build your mushroom path to collect mushrooms. This game incorporates several mechanics including set collection, worker placement, and tile placement. The artwork is stunning, and the base components are very nice. Additionally, storage for all the pieces is well thought out with designated spaces inside the box. The player boards are even magnetic to make keeping track even easier. Plus, deluxe components can also be purchased to make the game even more special. There are multiple paths to victory, and players are trying to have the most points at the end of the game.

Horrified: World of Monsters

- Age: 10+
- Players: 1-5

The latest game in the Horrified game series, Horrified: World of Monsters includes new gameplay with a multi-phase challenge. There is gameplay similar to the original Horrified game. The monsters in this game each have their own challenges to overcome. Players will battle the Sphinx, Yeti, Jiangshi, and Cthulhu. While this is a standalone game, it is compatible with Horrified: Greek Monsters, which was released last year. There are directions to mix and match the monsters between the games.

Mycelia

- Age: 9+
- Players: 1-4

Some games have a component that is unique and eye-catching; in Mycelia, that is the Shrine of Life with the dew drops. The art and components of the game are just beautiful, and look stunning set out on the table. Besides being beautiful, this deck builder adds in other components to make a captivating game. Plus, there is also a solo mode, which adds to the flexibility of playing the

game. The game board is also double sided to increase the variability.

Party Games

Block Party

- Age: 8+
- Players: 2-6

Channel your creativity to build a picture with blocks that looks like the target object. Block Party has everyone at the table scrambling for cubes. One player is the guesser and the remaining players select and build one of the items listed on their card for the round. To make it ever harder, there is a challenge each round to gain more points. The aesthetic of the game harkens to Minecraft with the cubes reminiscent of pixels. Block Party takes just minutes to learn and gets everyone laughing. Plus, you do not need a big group to play; there is a two-player mode.

That Escalated Quickly

- Age: 10+
- Players: 2-8

Take an absurd situation and answer the question with an intensity level based on a secret predetermined number. This game encourages creative and ridiculous answers. The hilarity continues as the reader has to then put the answers in order based on how they interpret the intensity. The goal is to put them in the correct order, which is much harder than it seems.

Dadada

- Age: 8+
- Players: 2+

Creating a new language was never so fun. In Dadada, players are assigning single-syllable cards to image cards to try and communicate with other players. This one-of-a-kind game works with a small or large group. You will never look at language and names of objects the same way again.

For the Younger Games

The Dog Ate My Homework University Games

- Age: 5+
- Players: 2-4

This silly game has you feeding a "homework" sheet to the dog. Next, you turn the crank (the dog ear) and the paper is shredded into seven pieces, mixed up, and comes out the back end of the dog. The players have to race to assemble the picture in 30 seconds and guess the picture.

Narwhal Waterfall

- Age: 6+
- Players: 2-5

Can you get all six narwhals across the river and avoid the waterfall? In this unique cooperative game, players have to navigate obstacles in the river plus a moving board that pushes the narwhals toward the waterfall. There is a crank and moving board that hangs over the edge of the table so the narwhals will fall if they get too close to the edge.

Dodo

- Age: 6+
- Players: 2-4

Save the egg! The dodo has a precious egg that it accidentally knocked out of the nest. Players work together to build bridges to safely get the egg to the boat at the bottom of the mountain. This game has been around for a few years in Europe and is now available in the United States. It has been recognized as a 2024 Toy Insider Top Holiday Toy and a 2024 TTPM (Toys, Tots, Pets and more) Best Artisan Toy. **

Video Game Highlight: The Legend of Zelda: Echoes of Wisdom

The Legend of Zelda franchise has been around since 1986 and people have been calling the main character Zelda this whole time. Thankfully, Nintendo finally released a game where that is accurate!

Echoes of Wisdom is the first game in the franchise that features Zelda on her quest to save Hyrule and every part of the game takes that into account. You aren't playing a silent protagonist anymore. Instead you are the literal Princess of Hyrule and everyone knows it. This makes things like side quests carry so much more weight because people have legitimate expectations.

The biggest difference, however, is combat. Instead of fighting with a sword and shield, Zelda primarily uses her wisdom and summons magical "Echoes" of monsters to fight her enemies and only transforms into a sword fighter for a limited time. This indirect style of combat takes some adjustments because it turns combat into more of a puzzle.

This made it a challenge for me to learn. I'm so used to my Zelda games being built around sword play that it was hard to adjust. Each of the echoes has their own strengths, weaknesses, and attack patterns so you need to think about which monsters to summon in each situation. But, I eventually settled on a handful of favorites and was able to progress with minimal frustrations. This will definitely be a source of frustration for gamers who struggle with patience as you do often have to wait for your summons to do their work and finish off the enemies on the screen.

Echoes change more than just combat though. Zelda learns to summon all sorts of non-combat echoes for things like beds, pots, and even a



cube of water. You can use these to help explore the map in ways that feel like you shouldn't. Every time I felt like I found a true boundary that would keep me in a lane, I would very quickly stumble upon a new echo that would give me a whole new way to think about traversal. I felt like I could go anywhere and do almost anything if I thought for a few minutes by the time I finished the game.

I was very concerned when Echoes was announced that it was going to be a second-rate spinoff. I was worried that it wouldnt give Zelda the respect she was due, but I was very pleased to find that my concerns were unwarranted. Echoes of Wisdom has all the polish and charm of Breath of the Wild and Tears of the Kingdom but moved into a toylike, 2D aesthetic. In fact, I regularly found my mind wandering and thinking about how the gameplay experience in Echoes might find its way into the next 3D Zelda game.

This is an adorable and accessible game that will be a wonderful introduction to the franchise for your family.

Board Game Highlight: **Neotopia**

Set in the not so distant future, in the year 2055, a group of entrepreneurs work to create an advanced city able to sustain itself and keep the balance harmonious between the three regions. Players use four elements produced in different factories to complete projects. Balance between the regions is the key in placement to optimize points to win the game.



- Element Tokens: (25 each: Sustainable Energy, Bio Farming, Technology, Community)
- Character Cards
- Project Cards
- First Player Card
- Score Pad
- Bonus Tokens
- Action Markers
- Scoring Markers
- Production Tiles
- Game Board

Game Play

Neotopia plays over multiple rounds, however the number of rounds is not fixed. Rather, it is determined by the Production Tiles. More Production Tiles are placed during set up as the player count increases. Once the last Production Tile is used, the end of game is triggered.

On their turn a player must perform three actions. There are only two types of actions that players can choose from, and they may complete the same action more than one time. The actions are:

1. Draw one card either from the top of the deck or the Offer (which is the field of cards).

2. Move one available element from a Factory to an adjacent Region.

Scoring

reotopia

Players score three ways in Neotopia. First, when a player fulfills one of their project cards, they immediately gain the points on the card on the score tracker for the region where the project was completed.

The other two ways to score occur at the end of the game. Each player gains one point for each Element Token of the color that matches their character in the largest cluster in each region. Clusters are tiles adjacent to each other. Players record the points from these clusters on the scoring track in that region. Scores are recorded on a scoring pad.

As you play it is important to spread your resources around to the three regions and not focus on just one region. In the first box on the scoring pad, you add the points of the region where you have the highest score. The second box is for the points in your second highest scoring region. The third box is for the region with the lowest points and will score triple.

Finally, you get three points for any unused bonus tokens. The player with the most points wins.

Family Game Assessment

Neotopia is an engaging tile-laying game. It was a hit with our gaming group from the first round of play. While at its core Neotopia is a tile-laying game, there are other components to the game play. Players also need to manage pattern making and hand management which makes it a more dynamic game, and adds layers of interesting challenges for the players to overcome.

During our first play of Neotopia, our group were all experienced gamers, so the mechanics were familiar from our previous gaming experience. Due to the multiple mechanics incorporated into Neotopia, having experience in each of the mechanics previously is helpful. While not a gateway game (a game well suited to a beginning gamer or a player new to the mechanic), Neotopia is a perfect next step for gamers ready for a slightly more challenging game.

What really stood out with the game was how easily the game flowed through the rounds and challenged our planning and strategizing. Especially early in the game, there are more options on tile placement and, as expected, the choices become more and more limited as the game progresses. By the last few rounds we had to really think and strategize on how to navigate the dwindling choices we had.

Final Thoughts

Neotopia is a light game, and great for players and families who are looking for something just a little more challenging than a gateway-level game. The artwork is beautiful and has the aesthetic of a much more complex game. Neotopia is a great addition to a family board game collection. It is a solid game, engaging to play, and lovely on the table. **

Super Mario Party Jamboree

This is the best Mario Party since the Nintendo 64 days. Each of the 5 new boards are amazing and the two retro boards are great as well. With 110 different mini games, you will not get bored with this game!

Let's Go to Japan

Have you ever wanted to plan a trip to Japan? Let's Go to Japan allows you to create your own trip itinerary and try to score more points than your opponent. While planning your trip, each card also gives you a little bit of information about Japanese culture and the history of the places you are planning to visit. At the end of the game, you get to describe your trip to your opponents which can be hilarious if you are not paying attention to where you place your cards.

Scout

This is a small box game with an amazing amount of gameplay inside. You take on the role of the leader of a circus trying to scout





Trash Pandas This is a cute and silly game for

the whole family. Tip over trash cans to collect food as a Trash Panda (Racoon). Players push their luck to gather as many different tokens as they can before they bust. The goal is to gather cards and stash them to score points at the end.



Blank Slate

Can you think like your friends, but just a little? In Blank Slate players are complet-

ing a phrase on a white board in secret. The goal is to only match with one other player to get the most points per round. This is quick, light, silly, and great for a crowd.

Wordle

The wildly popular online word game can now be played together around the table. One player chooses a five letter word, and the other players try to guess the word in the fewest number of turns. There are even tiles and white board to indicate letter placement (just like the web game). There are also rules for three additional modes of play: fast mode (be the first to solve the word), timed mode (beat the clock), and team mode.

Penny Black

Create an impressive stamp collection in this beautiful tile laying game. You choose stamps and place them in your stamp book over a ten round game. Each player has their own criteria they need to use when determining how to place their tiles. Can you collect the coveted Penny Black Stamp?



A Gentle Rain

This is a delightful solo tile laying game that involves playing a series of lily pads on to the

play area to earn points. It is challenging, but very peaceful. The 3d tiles are also gorgeous. This is a great game for folks that are looking for a puzzle like experiences.

Noctiluca

In this beautiful game, players collect bioluminescent noctiluca into jars. (Noctiluca are a marine microorganism which look like jellyfish but are a type of plankton.) Players collect sets of gorgeous, translucent, multicolor dice to earn points. There are lots of decisions to make on every turn (so long as you can take your eyes off the colorful patterns of dice). There is even a solo variant as well!



A New Switch is On the Way

The holiday season is coming up fast and a lot of parents are thinking about whether to get their families a new game console as a gift.

One question we've been getting a lot this year is whether or not now is a good time to buy a Nintendo Switch. Most years we would say "Yes" without hesitation. But, this year is a bit more complex.

Nintendo has revealed that the successor to the wildly popular Nintendo Switch is coming soon. But (as of the time of this writing) they have not given us any details. We technically don't know that it will function like the Switch does.

We still think that the Nintendo Switch is a great option for people looking for a good console that features family friendly games. But we think everyone who does buy one this year should do so with some knowledge and context under their belt.

1. The Switch Successor (whatever it is called) is definitely going to come out before next Christmas. This does mean that if you get a Switch this year, then your kids may be asking for a new console next year. But that's not a deal breaker for everyone.

2. Since we don't have

any details about the new console.... we don't have enough information to confidently tell people how the new console will handle current Switch games. Backwards compatibility is a hot button issue for a lot of games, but I know it is of particular importance to value-minded parents.

The Nintendo Switch is still great, but this is a complicated year for console recommendations. The most definitive suggestion we can give is "Buyer Beware."
